SEMINAR DIGITAL HISTORY: FROM DATA TO NETWORKS AND GIS

To some, "digital humanities" is a grand opportunity for historical research while for others, it is a buzzword. Applying digital methods to historical research has so far remained a niche, as the tools are not trained during the common history degree, and overtly complex terminology obstructs attempts of self-study. In this class, we look at how digital methods are being used in history, and learn how to use these tools for our own research projects—without coding skills.

PhD candidates are introduced to digital history with a special emphasis on spatial networks. For this, they acquire basic skills in Tableau, Gephi, and QGIS. Through the practice of creating database designs, exploring networks, querying data, and visualizating the results, they critically discuss how digital history can sometimes benefit their research and sometimes obscure their findings.

This seminar offers a new format of method training for PhD Candidates, which attempts to meet individual needs, rather than provide a broad overview about the research methods in global studies. It is a block seminar where PhD candidates are expected to actively work on their research methodology. Following the introduction session, PhD candidates have approximately one month to write a short draft methodology paper. The text should have approximately 4000 words (around 8 pages), and it should put in relation the research question, material, and methods, showing how they relate to the theoretical approach of the research. This text will be a starting point for the seminar, which is organized into two blocks: Block I when we will address methods for material collection and Block II for the analysis methods. Before the block seminar, PhD candidates work in groups on different methods, which are then discussed during the

block sessions. Participants are expected to consult material provided in Moodle, but also to contribute by bringing new material to different topics and actively join the discussions. During the block seminar, we will discuss the literature and engage in concrete problems arising when working with particular methods. The final session will be dedicated to the feedback. The final paper (as revised draft text from May) can be submitted for grading by the end of August.

The study of intercultural transfers has been one of the main methodological contributions of researchers at the Global and European Studies Institute, the Graduate School Global and Area Studies and the Research Centre Global Dynamics at Leipzig University to the investigation and interpretation of global and transregional entanglements. This has been put in place in a more than thirty years long cooperation with the research group around Michel Espagne at the Ecole Normale Supérieure in Paris, which found its expression in a series of conferences and workshops as well as many joint research projects and publications. Since the winter term 2020/21, this portfolio of exceptionally close collaboration has been enlarged to a joint virtual research seminar offered in a monthly rhythm by both institutions together. Since the beginning of 2023, the seminar forms part of the teaching programme of the Franco-German graduate school "Cultural Transfers", operated by Ecole Normale Supérieure-PSL and Leipzig University and funded by the Franco-German University.

The transnational seminar consists of presentations by invited international scholars on specific examples from their ongoing research. These sessions are held in French, English, or German. The thread running through the seminar is the question of the vectors that explain and promote the different cultural circulations in space and time, and the resemantizations that necessarily accompany such circulations across borders and boundaries of cultural spheres. The topics dealt with are deliberately varied in order to encourage contacts between disciplines and methodological discussions. One unifying theme is the transnational history and the epistemology of the humanities. Overall, the aim is to make participants familiar with an

approach that is both a methodological perspective and a specific theoretical foundation of the investigation of border-crossing phenomena.

For students and PhD-candidates enrolled in the MA "Global Studies", the MA "European Studies", the PhD-program "Global and Area Studies" as well as the Franco-German graduate school, we offer access to this transnational research seminar and add to its sessions a tutorial. The tutorial gives an introduction to intercultural transfer research with pre-recorded lectures and Q+A-sessions which invite participants to debate with the lecturers. This allows for a systematic overview of the complex relationship between intercultural transfer research, transnational history, and transregional studies.

The tutorial is offered in English. Its program for the summer term 2023 contains 4 pre-recorded lectures (20 to 40 minutes each) and 5 one-hour long Q+A sessions. It also requires attendance of the 4 two-hours long research seminar sessions. A list of selected readings allows participants to deepen their understanding of the topic and to prepare for their term papers. The requirement for the course within the MA programs mentioned above is the submission of an essay which follows the general rules for essay writing at GESI. For participants from the Graduate School the requirement is a 10-12 pages long paper that relates the approach of intercultural transfers to the specific topic of their dissertation.
