SEMINAR TRANSITIONAL JUSTICE IN THE REGIONAL AND GLOBAL CONTEXTS

TIME THURSDAY, 10AM-12PM

Transitional justice is a multifaceted concept that seeks to address the profound challenges posed by societies transitioning from conflict, authoritarian rule, or oppression to a more stable and just state of affairs. This seminar, titled "Transitional Justice in the Regional and Global Contexts," aims to examine the complex dynamics of transitional justice through a comparative lens, focusing on case studies in regions across Asia, Europe, and South Africa. The seminar delves into the intricate relationships among violence, justice, memory, and legacy in diverse socio-political contexts. It explores the ways in which these factors interplay and influence the transitional justice mechanisms implemented, emphasizing the significance of addressing historical injustices while promoting reconciliation and stability.

Furthermore, by drawing on the experiences of these regions, the seminar highlights the variations in transitional justice theories and practices, shedding light on the unique challenges each region has faced and the innovative solutions they have developed. Participants will gain a comprehensive understanding of the complexities of addressing past atrocities, the power of collective memory, the quest for justice, and the enduring legacy of transitional justice efforts on the broader global landscape.

The seminar provides a platform for in-depth discussions, the exchange of ideas, and the exploration of best practices in the field of transitional justice. To enable a diverse and inclusive exchange, the seminar lecturer also invites several scholars who specialize in these regions as guest lecturers in several sessions. By bringing together scholars and students from various disciplines to engage in an enriching dialogue, the seminar promises to be a valuable opportunity to foster critical thinking and advance our knowledge of the challenges and opportunities associated with the pursuit of justice in post-conflict and post-authoritarian societies. Grading will be based on the following elements:

Participation (40%): Attendance (max. 2 absences) and active class participation are essential.

Reading Responses (60%): Two critical reading responses are required. These responses must be written in a Word processor file format, double-spaced. Each response should be at least 800 words in length, but must not exceed 1,200 words. The stated page limits must be observed.

Optional: Students are encouraged to delve into a topic of their choosing and write a short research paper. However, this is not mandatory for the seminar. More details can be provided upon request.

SEMINAR METHODS IN SOCIAL SCIENCES AND HUMANITIES

[second year PhD candidates] This seminar offers a new format of method training for PhD Candidates, which attempts to meet individual needs, rather than provide a broad overview about the research methods in global studies. It is a block seminar where PhD candidates are expected to actively work on their research methodology. Following the introduction session, PhD candidates have approximately one month to write a short draft methodology paper. The text should have approximately 4000 words (around 8 pages), and it should put in relation the research question, material, and methods, showing how they relate to the theoretical approach of the research. This text will be a starting point for the seminar, which is organized into two blocks: Block I when we will address methods for material collection and Block II for the analysis methods. Before the block seminar, PhD candidates work in groups on different methods, which are then discussed during the block sessions. Participants are expected to consult material provided in Moodle, but also to contribute by bringing new material to different topics and actively join the discussions. During the block seminar, we will discuss the literature and engage in concrete problems arising when working with particular methods. The final session will be dedicated to the feedback. The final paper (as revised draft text from May) can be submitted for grading by the end of August.

The study of intercultural transfers has been one of the main methodological contributions of researchers at the Global and European Studies Institute, the Graduate School Global and Area Studies and the Research Centre Global Dynamics at Leipzig University to the investigation and interpretation of global and transregional entanglements. This has been put in place in a more than thirty years long cooperation with the research group around Michel Espagne at the Ecole Normale Supérieure in Paris, which found its expression in a series of conferences and workshops as well as many joint research projects and publications. Since the winter term 2020/21, this portfolio of exceptionally close collaboration has been enlarged to a joint virtual research seminar offered in a monthly rhythm by both institutions together. Since the beginning of 2023, the seminar forms part of the teaching programme of the Franco-German graduate school "Cultural Transfers", operated by Ecole Normale Supérieure-PSL and Leipzig University and funded by the Franco-German University.

The transnational seminar consists of presentations by invited international scholars on specific examples from their ongoing research. These sessions are held in French, English, or German. The thread running through the seminar is the question of the vectors that explain and promote the different cultural circulations in space and time, and the resemantizations that necessarily accompany such circulations across borders and boundaries of cultural spheres. The topics dealt with are deliberately varied in order to encourage contacts between disciplines and methodological discussions. One unifying theme is the transnational history and the epistemology of the humanities. Overall, the aim is to make participants familiar with an approach that is both a methodological perspective and a specific theoretical foundation of the investigation of border-crossing phenomena.
